This book brought to life by those who over the years, months, weeks have come to know Schutz and love it. Early in the morning Schutz stands as it has for parts of seven decades silent. The dogs of the neighborhood have stopped their barking. The carts rattling up and down the streets throughout the night have finally despensed with all their wares and are resting with their owners. A

school dog or cat is enjoying the solitude. And staff and students are beginning to stir knowing that it won't be long before bells start regulating another day one of 180 school days nearly identical but all filled with myriad things to do, things to learn, friends to enjoy and fun to be had.

Schutz even without people is an interesting place. It is unlike most schools in that it originally

was not built for a school. But some people have said that a student can learn from a good teacher while sitting on a rough log. Schutz is far from being a rough log with all its facilities but its relatively small student body and very adequate staff make it an ideal place to learn and live and enjoy.






The school was founded in 1924 on half the present campus using the main building, as it is now called for student and faculty living quarters as well as for classes. Some years later the second half of the property was acquired with no additional building being done for several decades. Even after World War


Il when the school enrollment began to grow, everyone was packed into the main building and what is now the clinic.

In the late fifties the classroom building was constructed
and the other two buildings
were used for boarding with up
to 90 boarders being housed.
But times have changed and the
boarding department has
ceased being the majority of
the student body although
through the 60's and 70's the

total enrollment has remained relatively stable.

But Schutz hasn't changed all that much. Alumni return to look around and they find many things the same · old trees in which they climbed are still in place, dorm rooms and class-rooms are still in use (remodeled of course) and playground space being used for the same





old games that have been played in schools for ages.

The student body has changed in some ways.
Students really are the same but we like to think of them in terms of nationality sometimes and Schutz displays a flag for each

country represented in the school with three dozen or so flags on display now days. Do they all know English when they come to school? Some do not but an amazing thing about humans is that they can learn rather quickly to use a second language when they find themselves with people who can't speak their own language. The younger the better but even

older students learn suprisingly fast even though Schutz does not assign non-English speaking students to a class by themselves. The pressure of wanting to know what is going on works miracles in getting the new language fixed in ones mind.







Facilities are available for all sorts of activities at Schutz. The auditorium is outfitted for theatrical productions - both school produced and those of the community theater group. Schutz finds itself as the English speaking community center for many things - cultural, recreational and medical. Day students

stay all hours until they get sent home and parents find the school a pleasant place to visit and find out what is going on and finding that most things for them seem to go on right on campus.

Activities ranging from karate to community chorus attract both students and parents and others as do craft classes of all types as well as community bar-b-ques and basketball games.

The school tries not to segregate students from community activities or academics from those things considered by some as being non-academic. Learning and participating in all kinds of things are interwoven into the school program.





These pictures of places without people will remind you of the place when you were there with people. Was it climbing in the old twisted tree by the basketball court, or walking on cables running from one tree to another, or trying to get a ball down that was stuck up there


some place? Or was it perhaps falling out of a tree and breaking an arm or running into a tree while playing hide and seek at night or doing other things?

that once were dear to some heart.




The staff comprises all ages making it nice when you are looking for some with the right point of view.







Living close is sometimes tough but when we look around us in Egypt and see how close together others live, we're lucky.








Schutz staff seem to be a breed apart from so many who work for other than love of the job that they are doing and helping students to become better persons. Schutz students are fortunate.

And all Schutz teachers are not adults. A number of students give time to helping other students not realizing until later that one learns a great deal in helping others learn.




A home ec class this year tried to find out the favorite foods of boarding staff and

that "It's a Small Small World".












Graduation at Fairhaven is as important as graduation any where with music and processions and speeches and congratulatory handshakes and brownies and cool aide.




















Alia writes, "I love being in sixth grade. I love my teacher.
