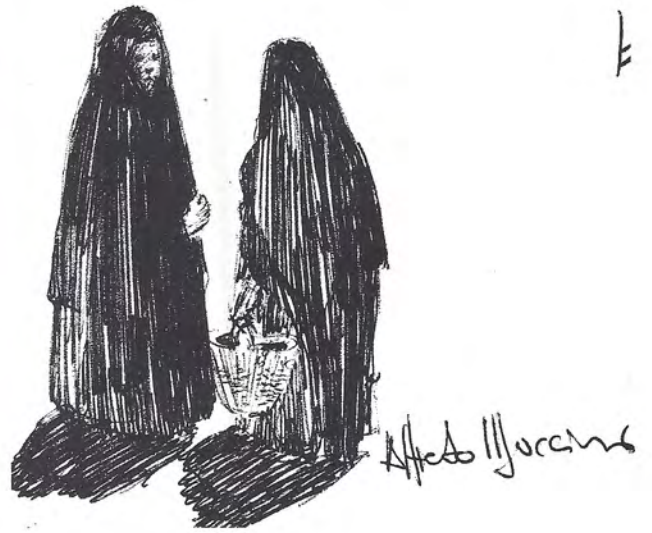
Activities

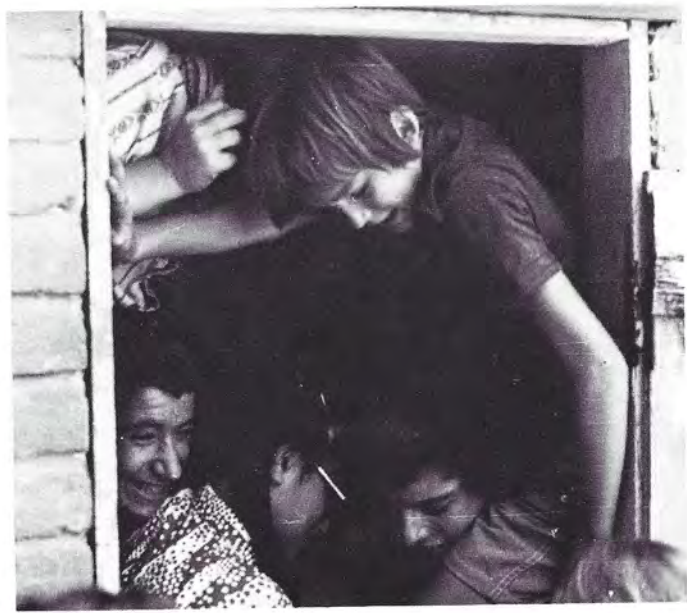




# winter

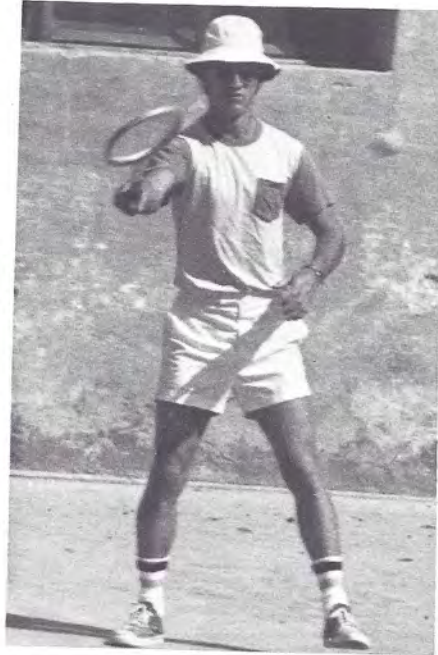
