REPORT FROM SCHUTZ SCHOOL HEADMASTER, LARRY PATTEE

Another great year at Schutz American School. We are full and had to turn away qualified students because of lack of space in the classrooms. We still accept all expatriates but just barely. Local students are accepted on a space available basis and space is not always available. Our teachers are great and can handle more students but the classrooms are small and we just are short of physical space.

We have another great group of teachers that Schutz is famous for. Several Canadians have joined our staff in recent years and they are a welcome addition. We have a new principal, Jeanie Forde, who comes from Edmonton, Alberta and she is doing a fine job with our students, teachers and parents. Ron and Janie Walters continue to do an excellent job for us in all respects. Because of the nature of our school and of the international education scene we do have some faculty turnover each year but have been fortunate in finding well qualified replacements.

This year we continue to implement our strategic plan. Emphasis is on goal setting for all students, staff and board. We are trying to get all students to have reasonable goals and a way to achieve them. We are beginning to be more involved in community service, which is a significant part of the strategic plan. We always work on the improvement of teaching and curriculum and that is going well too. We just had a five year accreditation evaluation by two men, one from New England and the other head of the American School in the Netherlands. They seem pleased with our school and continuing accreditation is not a problem. It was a pleasant visit and experience. This year we are doing block scheduling for middle and high school. Most teachers like it a great deal. Large blocks of time mean less time setting up and taking down, changing, etc., and more time teaching and learning. We are pleased with it to date. Of course, elementary schools such as Pharos, have been doing block scheduling for years so it is not new for them.

Our local board, which by the way is a wonderful board, is doing an incredible job of helping us find ways to expand. We can envision a larger school in the future and need more space to do that. Land is quite expensive here but the board is looking hard at all options. These things move slowly but they are moving. There is hope that we may be able to have more space for a larger school. We will keep you posted on that important item. Lavina and I had our usual great time at the Schutz reunion last summer. Sort of a highlight of our summers home, seeing all the wonderful Schutzites. Our continuing thanks and appreciation to Jean and all the faithful friends and alumni who work so hard for our school and its friends.

NIKITA'S REPORT

It was the year of 1981 that I was born in the city of Sevastopol, USSR. Now, sixteen years later, the country of my birth shattered into pieces. I am a citizen of Ukraine, a state that language of which I don't know, being an ethnic Russian.

During the last years of the Soviet regime, my family and I left for Egypt resulting in the continuation of my studies in a system totally different to the one I had been subjected to in the past. It is an American school that I have spent five years in already and, due to the vast differences in the educational approach, it is presently quite impossible for me to go back to Ukraine and study at a school that has changed its name but not its traditions. And even if it were possible for me to succeed in this alien environment, I would not like it, for I have learned to appreciate my new school style of teaching which emphasizes thinking for oneself, not absorbing one-sided statements. I am proud that I have been able to meet quite high academic standards for the past several years, having particular interest in such subjects as social studies, the English language and literature, as well as new technology in the areas of science, business, and computers. One of my goals being a many-sided life, I have tried to divide my time between sports, such as basketball, and my hobby of reading books in Russian and in English in order to fill the gaps that might be in my education. Unfortunately, due to financial problems that my family is encountering in a foreign country now (after the collapse of the USSR and the closure of most of the Russian and Ukrainian representations here, my father started working for the local company), it is not only the prospects of college education, but also the completion of High School that remain unclear.

Dear friends of Schutz,

This note from Nikita seems accurate in all respects. The political and financial world have collapsed around this family. The well paying USSR job here no longer exists so his father is working for a local firm at a quite low salary. The economic situation in all the republics of the former USSR is terrible. It is even worse for an ethnic Russian to try to return to their home city, in Ukraine and look for work. They are struggling here to try to finish high school for Nikita because he is doing so well. He needs to be here if possible. He is a student with a great mind. He does not have all "A's" because he is sometimes bored and working and doing things beyond the class. He and another student worked independently on European History last spring, took an AP test in it and got a five, the highest grade. Just did it in his spare time. He takes a full load of challenging classes and also works part time grading math papers for Ron Walters.

Students such as Nikita give me great hope for the future. He has some financial problems right now but he is so capable, understands the political problems but is internationally exposed and aware and can make a difference in our world. I have great hopes for Nikita and others like him in our school and in our world. Eventually they will tear down these artificial barriers and the world will be real and safe.

The financial problems are real. We do what we can for scholarship help but are very limited in what we can do. Gifts this summer from Schutz friends and other friends are helping a great deal but are not sufficient. We need more gift support.

If you could consider a gift to this fine student, for this fine purpose, it will be greatly appreciated. I cannot think of a better investment than Nikita and others like him. Please send gifts to Jean Stultz, or directly to me in Schutz. Either way will work.

One last note, Nikita's father, in my office with great appreciation said, "Imagine, after all our countries have been through, that the Americans will give money to a Russian." I think that sums up my hopes and dreams for the world. Please help if you can.

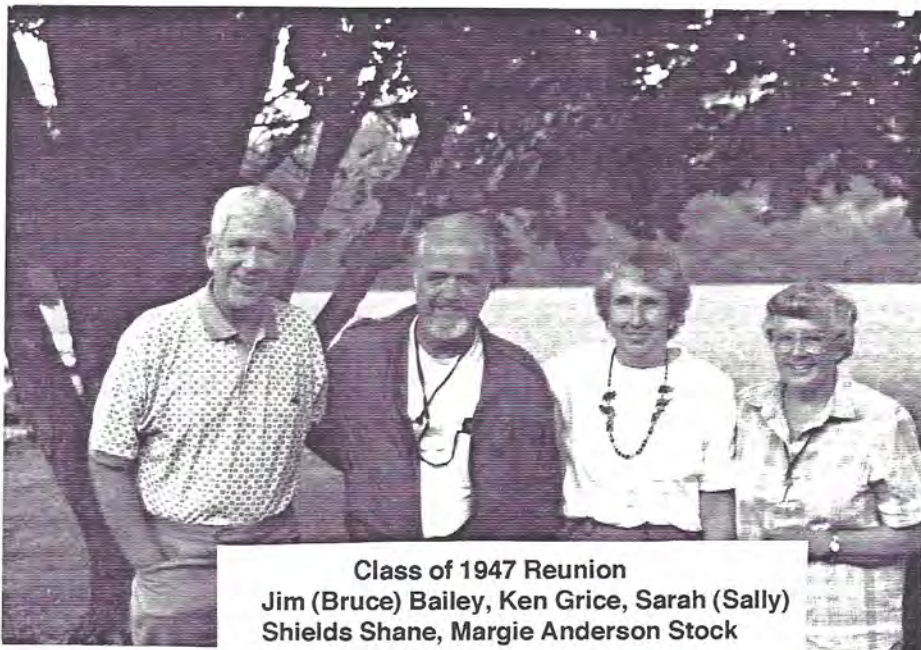
Like most before us, none of our class actually graduated from Schutz. Our days at our beloved school were cut short for all of us when we were in the seventh grade. Our class had a number of unique experiences. Our time at Schutz was between 1935/36 and 1942/43 - the time of the Second World War. Egypt, while not a combatant in the war was never the less a staging area for allied soldiers and by 1940/41 had become a battle ground as Rommel pushed across North Africa. Our nights were interrupted by air raid alarms, an occasional bomb scare and great fun finding shell shrapnel in the sand the next morning. In 1940 the school was moved to Assuit and a whole new set of fun experiences took place.

Enough reminiscing, every class believes that theirs was a unique "Schutz" experience and the class of 47 is no different (even if we are "Old"). There were at the most only seven members of the class (most of us remember only six). When we ascertained that only four of us would be at the reunion, and realized that all of us had siblings who might attend the "big" Schutz reunion, we decided to enlarge the group and invite as many of the pre WWII alumni as we could locate on short notice. The mini reunion was held at Dr. and Mrs. Ken Bailey's country home North of New Wilmington on the Saturday afternoon preceding the main event. July 26, to be exact.

Nineteen people were in attendance. We spent the afternoon sharing our remembrances of our days at Alexandria and Assuit. I expect that the stories have grown in remembrance after 50 plus years but not much for our shared experience of Schutz, we all agreed, was special and unique. In some ways we were educationally far ahead of our "American" class mates but most of us were not prepared socially or emotionally for American high school.

The afternoon was concluded with a pot luck picnic supper on the Bailey's back yard. We enjoyed ourselves so much that we decided to make it an annual affair. A gathering of the Schutz "Mish-Kids" (Schutz alumni who were children of Missionaries) will, hopefully be an ongoing prelude to the annual Schutz reunion.

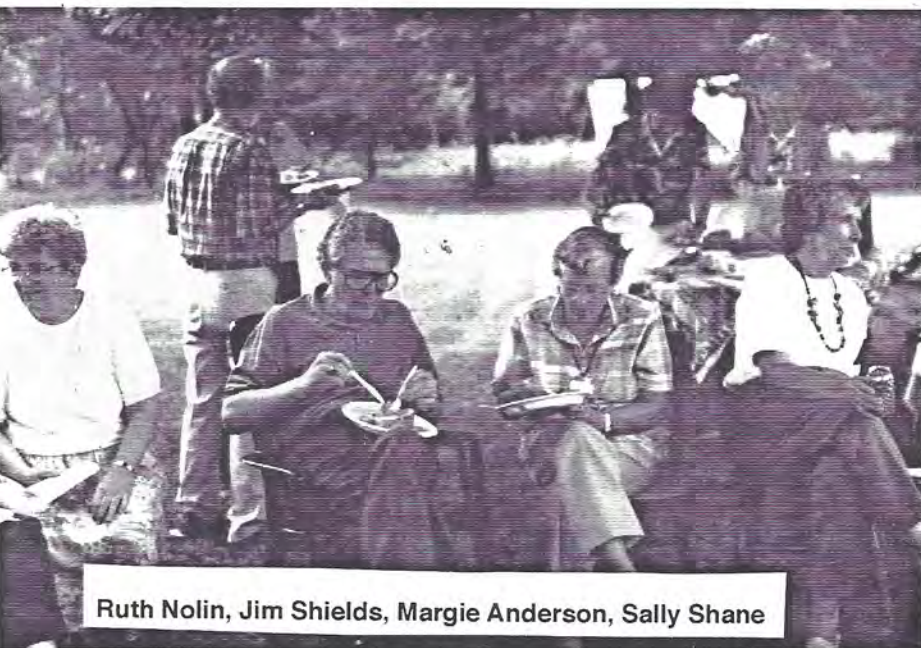

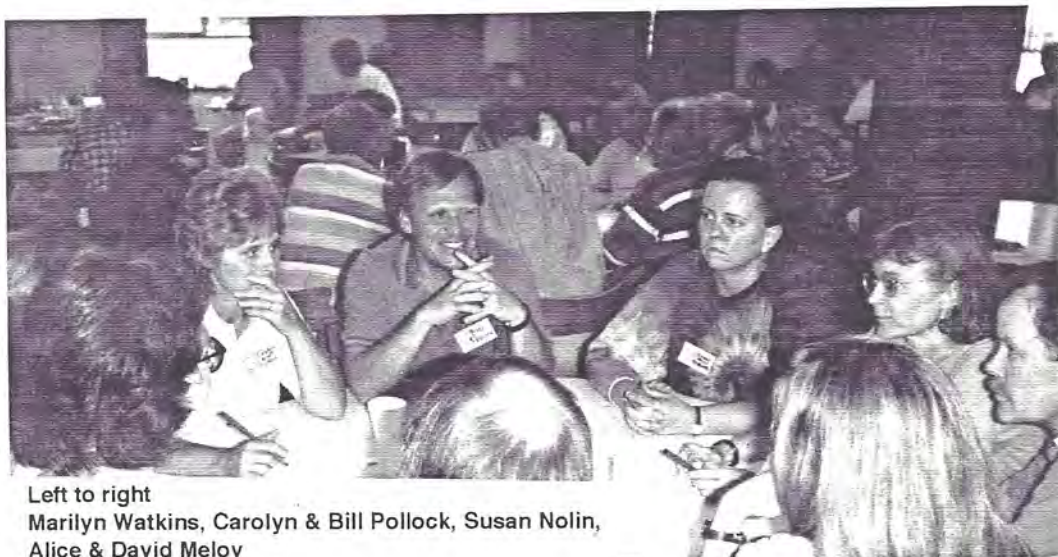

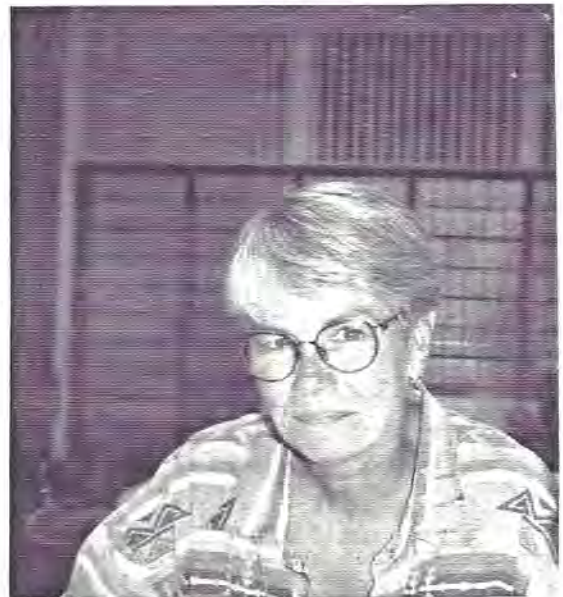

POLICY FOR THE USE AND DISTRIBUTION OF PERSONAL INFORMATION BY SCHUTZ AMERICAN SCHOOL, INC.

Information about Schutz School alumni and former staff and friends, compiled by SAS, Inc., is intended for use by members of SAS, Inc. and other Schutz alumni and former staff only. It may not be used in any way for commercial purposes or personal financial gain. Receipt of a signed agreement to that effect is required prior to access to the SAS, Inc. databases. Personal information may be distributed only with the consent of each individual involved. A consent form will be included with the Schutz newsletter.

Schutz American School, Inc. maintains two databases for Schutz School alumni. The first is a list of names of students by graduating class, specifying dates of entry into and departure from Schutz American School. The second database is a broader listing of alumni, former staff, and friends of Schutz. It contains fields for name, address, home and work telephone numbers, occupation and place of work, general dates of attendance at Schutz, and a description of each individual's relationship to Schutz. Both databases are intended for access and use by SAS, Inc. members and other Schutz School alumni and former staff to facilitate the notification about Schutz School news and special events, the reestablishment of contacts between old friends, and information exchange in general. The second database is primarily used as a mailing list for the Schutz newsletter. A new field should be added to each database to indicate whether or not consent to distribution has been granted, so that the data may be sorted by that field; only records for which consent has been given are to be included in any file for distribution.

The Schutz Web Site is designed to present general information about and a history of Schutz School, as well as the names and addresses of Schutz alumni, to anyone with access to the internet. No personal information, including name and addresses, should be posted therein without the consent of each individual being named.

On a tentative basis, we are looking at Fall 1998 and need your input, suggestions, concern, etc. to offer an opportunity that will appeal to most of you.

Initially, we are thinking of two different options that would operate as the same trip. Departure for everyone would be the same, arrival in Cairo and transfer to Alexandria for a 3-4 night stay to visit the school and see how Alexandria has changed over the years. We would then transfer back to Cairo for an additional 3 nights, enabling visits to the Museum, the Pyramids, the Muski, etc. Those wanting just the 8 day version would then fly home.

Subject: Schutz History Project

We thank the SAS, Inc. Board for its continuing support of our project, in particular the financial support given us last year. The money is being used to pay telephone bills and, sometime during this year, a plane ticket for one of us to visit the other for an extended period of work.

We are pleased that we have made progress on the Schutz History project during the past year. We have now completed about 275 pages of a chronology for the years 1924 through 1967. Of course, there are about 30 more years still to be chronicled. Unfortunately, the materials we have on the post-1967 period are somewhat meager compared with what we have for the earlier period, so the next "chapter" may be much less work!

What we have already written is not publishable in its current form. Our next step will be to reshape the chronology, adding focus and analysis to produce a narrative that clearly defines the Schutz experience. In the coming year, we will be working both on constructing the post-1967 chronology and reworking the early material.

During the past year we have continued to conduct phone and mail interviews with participants in the Schutz Story. We also had our first "audit" or review of work to date when Wayne Halsema read and commented on the chronological narrative for the first period of the history. Wayne, as some of you may know, was an historian who had done some research of his own on the Egypt Mission. Furthermore, we have learned of the existence at

the Presbyterian Historical Society of about 70 boxes of uncatalogued files from the Church offices in New York from 1958 until 1991. These are in addition to the six boxes of files specifically on the Egypt Mission that we have seen already. Three members of the Philadelphia Canterbury Clerics group, Don Black, David Gelzer, and Newt Thurber, have volunteered to sort through these documents and prepare the files for cataloging by the Presbyterian Historical Society. As they do so, they will be looking for information pertaining to our project and will provide us copies of what they find. Obviously, they are performing a tremendous service to the Historical Society and, incidentally, to us. Finally, **we plan to continue to search for Schutzes from the 1970s, 1980s, and 1990s in hopes of soliciting more material about those years. We would appreciate your help in this endeavor.**

One last note: We have talked with Dr. Kristin Gleeson, Manager of the Archives at the Presbyterian Historical Society, about the documents which have been given to us by people related to Schutz. Dr. Gleeson told us that the Historical Society would welcome with enthusiasm any letters, diaries, memoirs, photographs, etc. pertaining to the Presbyterian missionary experience. **We encourage you to endorse this kind of donation. The Presbyterian Historical Society already has the best collection anywhere of Presbyterian missionary records, and its eagerness to expand its holdings is gratifying to anyone interested in saving the history of our common past.**

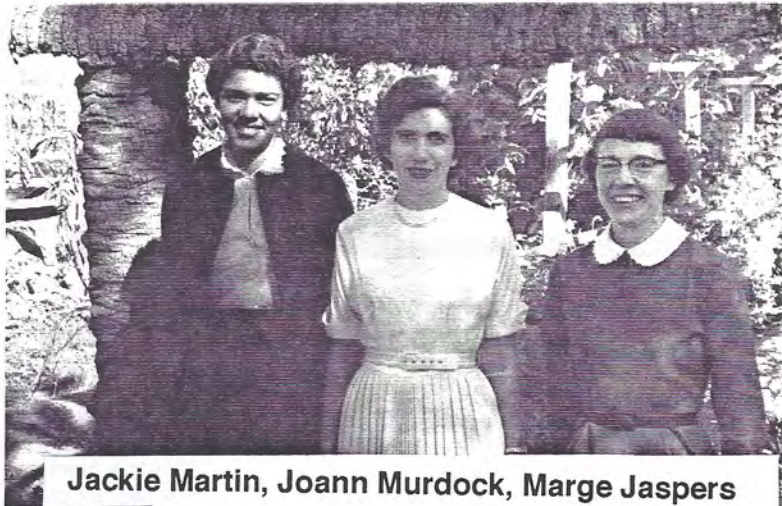
The cost of this trip would probably be in the range of \$1800 per person based on double occupancy and would include round-trip airfare, ground transportation, sightseeing, and hotels.

Rachel and I have been reading through the April '97 newsletter. Your note of names without addresses has prompted me to make a postponed and neglected inquiry. "Ann Heller" is Anne Moore Heller, died 11-18-96 in the retirement facility where she was living, Windsor Park Manor in Carol Stream, IL. In April '96 we stopped to see her but found her in the medical section and unable to speak. I believe she had suffered a fall not long before. My thought to call her in the months since had not materialized. On a visit perhaps in '91 or '92, we had written down the address and names of Anne's sister, Isabel Moore Bunting, and of Isabel's daughter's family, now in Glastonbury, CT. I telephoned Isabel's daughter's home and was happy to meet Sheila (Mrs. Peter Dewberry), by telephone, and share family information. He was a Navy or Marine aviator and went down in the Pacific. Anne had his medals and record. In 1931/32 Don was in about the 9th grade, perhaps a year younger, but grouped along with Charles Adams, Maurice Gephart, and David Thompson, in my memory. My grandfather was a first cousin of Dr. (MD) Bill Moore of Tanta Hospital (father of Anne, Isabel and Don), as I understand, so we are 'related'.

After developing a routine for getting the daily shopping done, informing the maids which rooms to clean and prepare for new guests, and doing the bookkeeping, I found there was enough time left to consider finishing the project begun a year earlier for the Synod schools. Most of the video footage had been taken, so I only needed to few more minutes. This time I brought a lapel microphone along, and the results were much better. Background noise from traffic and the general buzz of the schools were eliminated. A studio in Maadi worked with me, and so did the new metro. Getting to Maadi in the past was always a hassle. I left Schutz and Egypt in July '69, attended the American School in Paris and graduated in '70. I then went to State University of N.Y. at Buffalo as a Freshman. One Buffalo winter drove me to the conclusion I was a Mediterranean at heart and decided to go to Israel. I hiked thru Europe visiting my friends including many of my Schutz cronies and finally landed in Israel in Sept. '71. I went straight to a kibbutz up north, started learning Hebrew and working in the fields. The change in my life was incredible!! I used to drive my dad's Jag to Schutz parties, and here I was working the land, my land, on a kibbutz. It was a fantastically healthy feeling!

I attended Jerusalem's Hebrew University from '72-'75, Pol-sci, Economics, international relations etc. Went into the army in '75 (nothing like infantry)

In '77 I went back to the kibbutz, then spent 2 years in Safet, a small ancient town restoring old buildings. '79 back to Jerusalem where I met Binia, my U.K.-born wife-to-be who was at art school. We got married in '85 and I got into antique furniture restoration. I worked for the Israel Museum for 7 years and in '94 opened my own business and have been at it since.

After I left in '69, I lost touch with all my friends, everybody dispersed all over the globe. I couldn't even see my parents for 6 years (my mom) and 8 years (my dad) because Egypt and Israel were at war, and Jews were not allowed to leave Egypt and come back.

Once the peace was signed I came to visit Schutz in '81 during the summer holidays, said hi to George Meloy and left. It wasn't until I took my 12 year old daughter back that I started wanting - and could - get in touch with my childhood friends and experiences.

Gloria Starbuck and Lindsay came to visit us in Jerusalem and they brought Judy Hoffman. We had a great time!

We praise God that there is grain in the fields which they are eating with their second crop of sorghum planted and growing. God's arm was not short providing rain and sun as needed. We have been through the FaFa riots and a bout of stealing. Lutheran World Federation provided 300 boxes of nutritional biscuits helping the children. In the midst of this God has stretched out His hand to do signs and wonders and to heal in the name of Jesus. The Surma Christians have spoken the Word of God boldly and many have heard the Good News. **FaFa Riots:** FaFa is a high protein cereal which was primarily for children at risk but also for mothers and those who are sick. 15 bags donated by the Wycliff branch here in Ethiopia was enough to feed more than 1,000 women and children. We decided to call them by villages with the headman from each responsible for controlling them. Little did we now that **NO ONE** can control Surma women even the headman with a stick. I found myself pushing women back at the door who were desperately shouting and pushing and shoving trying to get into the clinic to get their ration. I even found myself striking some of them. It won't that we weren't praying-we were-but they were out of control. Finally our clinic helper, Kamu and I went to the clinic at 6 a.m. one morning and walked around the clinic praying. First we confessed the sins of us all in our response to the people, asking God to bind Satan, giving the clinic and all our work into His hand and praising Him. That day there were no riots! I'm not saying the women were quiet but they were under control and it was God in control. After that day, things were better but when they got out of hand we set someone to PRAISING GOD and things settled down. Actually, one couldn't have a nicer excuse, apology, for not getting a greeting off to all of you. Jean, thank you so much for the "Schutz/Egypt letter". I cannot put into words how much I appreciate being kept in contact over all of these years. Little by little I'm on my second time through and having time to "store" things in my memory. On the night of the 16th of Sept, full moon, we had a beautiful total eclipse here. It was visible in Jerusalem, too. Our daughter was with a group that was going to make a Negiv desert tour by full moon. The planners didn't realize about the eclipse, so they had a beautiful sight -- as well as several hours delay. Preamble to The By-Laws of the American Overseas Schools Historical Society

The origin, evolution and development of American education abroad is a remarkable human and educational success story that spans 150 years. This history, of educating American youth and children overseas, is a rich heritage of which coming generations should not be deprived. How rich, few now fully realize, but a history which goes back to the mid 1850's and includes the stories of schools, students, parents, teachers, school administrators and support personnel worldwide should be recorded and preserved.

Early students and their teachers are gone; the ranks of their followers who have also endured the hardships of attending and administering American schools abroad are rapidly thinning. The stories of their experiences in laying the foundation for the present are, with their passing, slipping from our grasp never to be recovered.

It was to prevent, in some measure, this irreparable loss that The American Overseas School Historical Society was founded in July 1995. It was undertaken also in the hope that it might inspire others to take up the unfinished task to preserve for posterity this priceless legacy.

The overseas education of more than two million American children and youth is an important, as yet unwritten chapter in the history of American Education. These students, their parents, teachers, school administrators and support personnel have lived on the edge of history-in-the-making in view of the Berlin Wall going up and coming down, Corregidor, Tiananmen Square, the DMZ in Korea and the China Sea, within earshot of the Six-day War, the Persian Gulf War and the invasion of Panama. They have lived and played near international military and political headquarters, been visited by presidents, prime ministers, royalty and ambassadors. They have studied and taught in a wide variety of physical facilities in the shadows of historic castles, near battlegrounds and famous landmarks. They have been evacuated from installations worldwide and removed due to massive political actions in Austria, France, and Libya. This represents the schooling of several generations of American children and youth under circumstances unique to human history.

To collect, record and preserve the histories and memorabilia of these overseas schools, The American Overseas Schools Archives was established in November of 1989. Since then the archives have received hundreds of thousands of items from around the world--personal histories; school histories; video and audio tapes; photographs; yearbooks, scrapbooks, old and current curricula; newspapers, magazine and journal articles; expired official documents, papers and records; the files and records of accrediting associations and teachers' unions; and other memorabilia. Many individuals have also donated personal collections.

With the establishment now of the American Overseas Schools Historical Society, which will own, govern and operate The American Overseas Schools Archives, this important work will be guaranteed and carried on in perpetuity.
