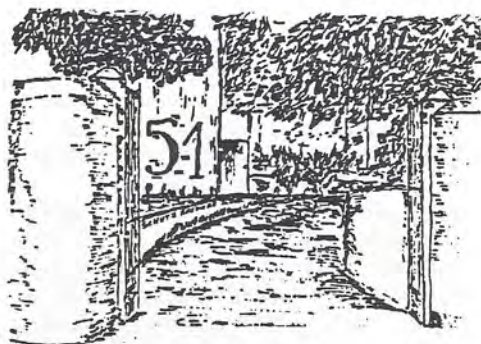

Schutz started another school year on August 30. We have a great staff and a nice bunch of students so it looks like an exceptionally good year. Our staff all relate well to students, are good teachers, and do all of the things that make Schutz what it is. We have a few more students than last year, a total of 205. The biggest number of students come from Egypt, the next country is the United States and after that there are 32 other countries represented. It is a nice mix of very capable students.

We continue to have Alexandrians return to the country and bring their children with them to come to Schutz. Many of these children are very much American or Canadian or whatever but are returning to their roots. Some of these have adjustments to make, but it is nice to have them as students.

Because of space limitations, we have had to turn down several students who were qualified. We reserve space for ex-patriots coming to Alexandria and we simply did not have a space to accept everyone who applied this year. It is not easy to turn people away, especially when you know that their educational options are limited. The positive side of the coin is that the students we have are very capable and very good students. One of the sad things is to turn people away who should be at Schutz but simply can't afford the tuition. Tuition costs vary from \$3,500 to \$8,240 so they are substantial. Some families simply cannot afford that. We have very modest scholarships available but it simply doesn't meet our needs. Any gifts or support of scholarships for needy and deserving students would help us a great deal. It is hard to turn people away who should be at our school.

Each year we are blessed by having Schutzites visit us. Marilyn Watkins has added immeasurably to our academic program this year with her workshops, advice and support. Susan Nolin Shopland, her husband Mark and their children are positive additions to the school this year. In addition we often have visits from Schutzites and we look forward to those as well. There is a place for you at Schutz if you want to come and visit and see what is happening. Egypt is still an exciting place to visit and Schutz is still a wonderful school.

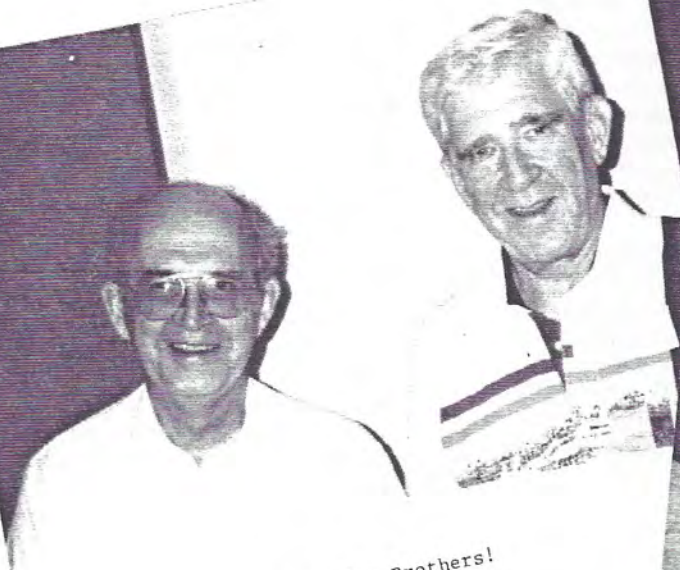

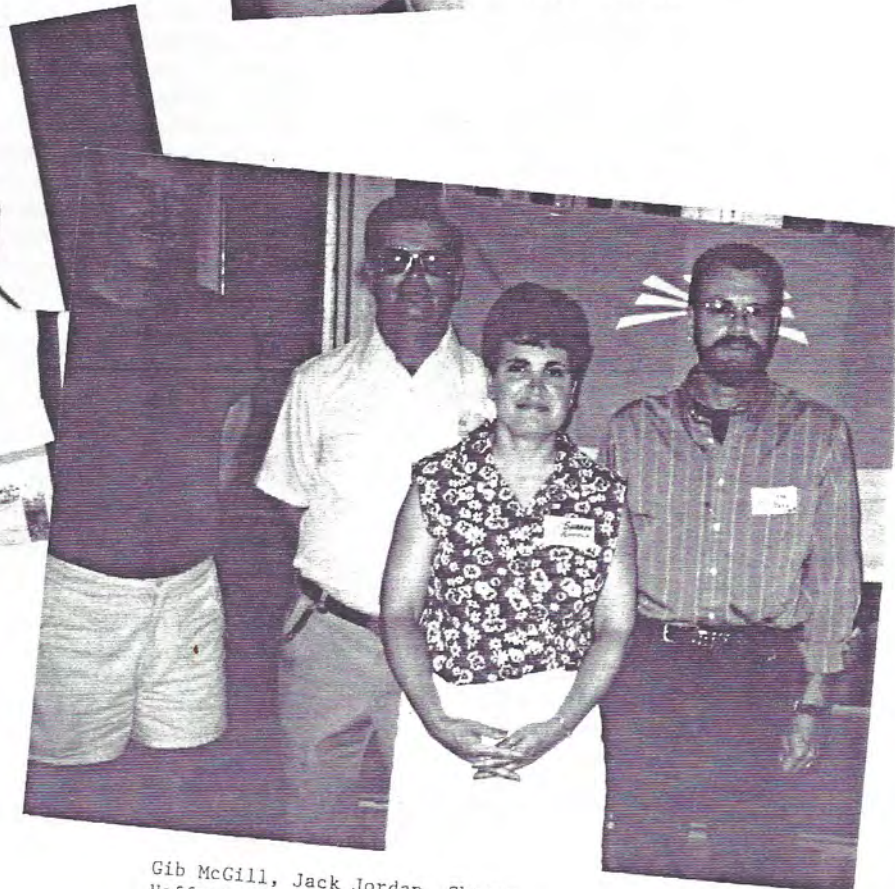

One day recently, I was driving to work very early in the morning. It was darker than usual because it was raining. It was that wonderful kind of spring rain that comes from very dark clouds that fill the sky. As I looked up at the clouds, I felt that they were much lower than usual seeming to hug the earth. I happened to glance to the East and saw a clearing sky with the sun just above the horizon, glowing bright, warm orange. How can it be raining so hard and still be sunny? How can it be so dark and still so light? As I drove along reflecting on nature and enjoying it, I realized that our lives are very much like that. Light and dark,

Sunshine and Rain, all at the same time. In our grief we sometimes feel like it's all darkness and yet the sun still shines in the gentle smiles and touches of those who love us or in the carefree laugh of a child bringing light and lightness to us even when we're reluctant to feel anything but pain. One woman said, "I don't want the pain to stop because I'm afraid I'll forget." Another, looking at a person just finishing a year of grieving and still very distraught, said: "I can't stand the thought of always feeling like this." Fortunately we don't always feel the same way. When I'm happy and full of light, I think it will last forever. When I'm sad, in pain or depressed, I am afraid that will last forever and I forget that I did not always feel this way. The challenge is to remember that feelings come and go like the clouds in the sky. Just as there are light and dark, small and large clouds, so there are similar feelings, light and dark, small and large. And they change. One thing I do know is that I don't forget anyone I love whether they are here with me or far away, living or dead. I may sometimes feel the joy of their memory or the pain of their absence but I NEVER forget.

Maya Angelou, the poet and author says: "When I sense myself filling with rage at the absence of a beloved, I try as soon as possible to remember that my concerns and questions, my efforts and answers should be focused on what I did or can learn from my departed love. What legacy was left which can help me in the art of living a good life?"

This is my question, too. In the midst of this light in darkness what have I learned that can help me in the art of living a good life?

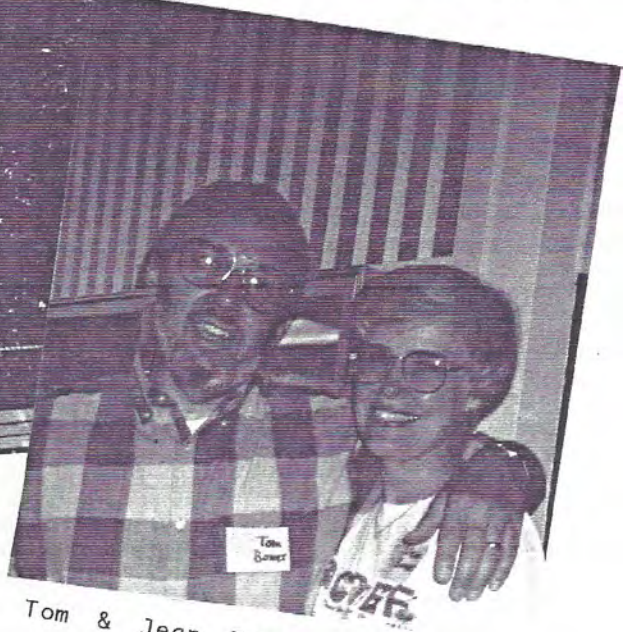

From Feb. '95 Boma Bulletin - As the meeting with the administrator came to a close, he said, "One positive thing I have to say is that since your move to Tulegit, the security problems in the area have improved by 65%. It is as if your presense there is a 'Bridge of Peace'." He was referring to the serious tribal clashes which have been greatly reduced since our move. Several projects are now in progress. Two clinic buildings, and a residence for a Health assistant are now being built. We are capping a spring and digging 3 kilometers of pipeline to supply water to the project site and community around us. Two griding mills for the people will be installed. **HARVEY & LAVINA HOEKSTRA'S** ministry grew out of their 30 years in Africa where they served as missionaries in the Presbyterian Mission in a joint Presbyterian/RCA program. Before going to the field, they were trained for the task by the Wycliffe Bible Translators. During those years, Harvey translated the New Testament into the Anuak language in the Sudan followed by 15 years in Ethiopia working among an unreached people, the Mesengo, living in the rain forest of Southwest Ethiopia. The Hoekstras pioneered in the use of cassettes for effective evangelism among several language groups in Ethiopia. It was these experiences that led them into a full-time cassette ministry after the door to Ethiopia closed to missionary service for them there. In 1977 they established regional centers overseas where they trained and equipped nationals to record entire New Testaments for people unable to read. New Testaments in more than 100 languages were recorded in Africa, India, Bangladesh, Singapore and Indonesia. Harvey and Lavina's son Paul now directs the work they started in Asia. In 1989 the Hoekstras organized Audio Scriptures International to make available these same overseas recordings for ethnic ministries in the USA and Canada. ASI was organized to help meet the challenge of a changing America with its phenomenal increase in peoples with their different languages, religion and cultures. Harvey and Lavina are assisted by their son Mark, his wife Sandy, and others. Dr. Hoekstra has just completed writing a book on the Hoekstras' missionary experiences during their thirty years in the Sudan and Ethiopia. They are seeking prayer for the Lord to lead them to a publisher interested in printing it.

Never, Never use the following terms when writing: Evangelism, Church-planting, Frontiers mission agency, Missions or missionary, Kurds, Israel.**

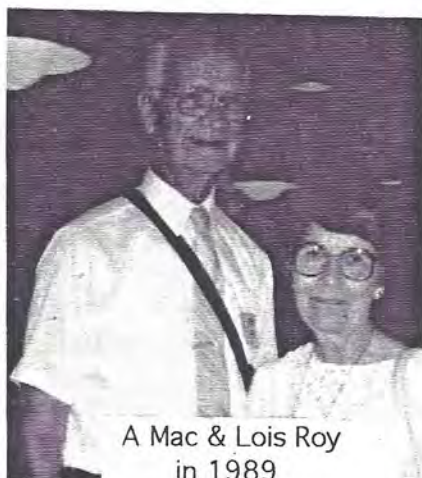

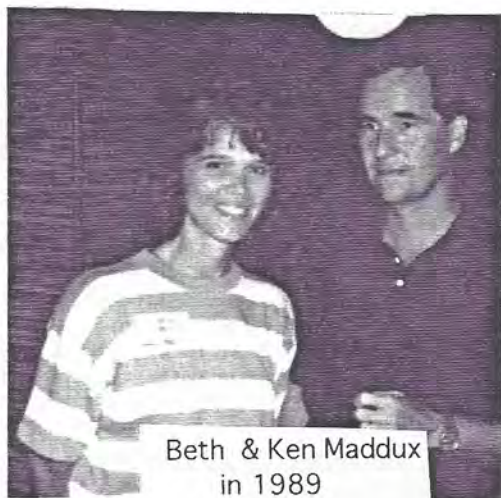

I have finally managed to get copies of photographs taken during the Schutz reunion in August 1994 that was held in South London.

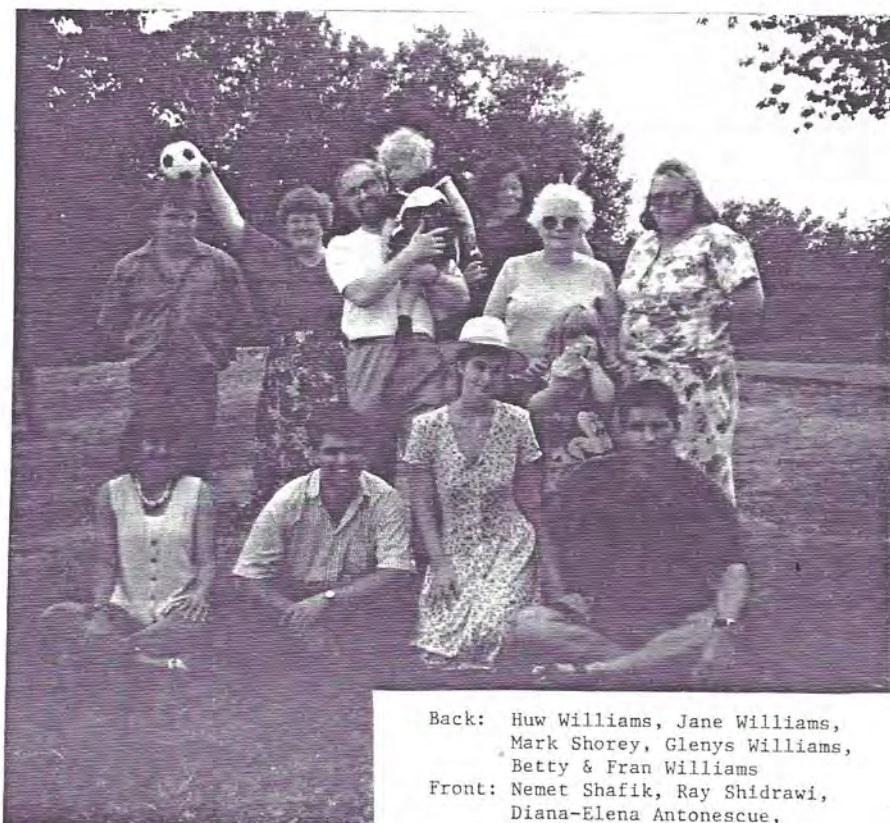

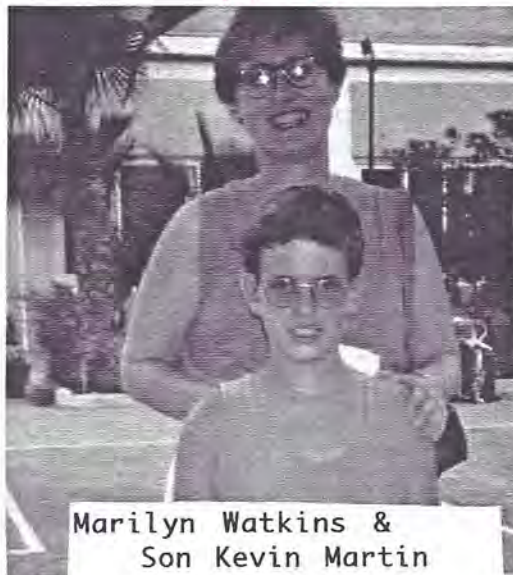

We had workshop sessions on classroom management and assessment led by Dr. Marilyn Watkins, former Schutz student (1957-61, 63-66), who is now an Associate Professor of Education at Indiana University East. Marilyn's son, Kevin, attends 4th grade at Pharos.

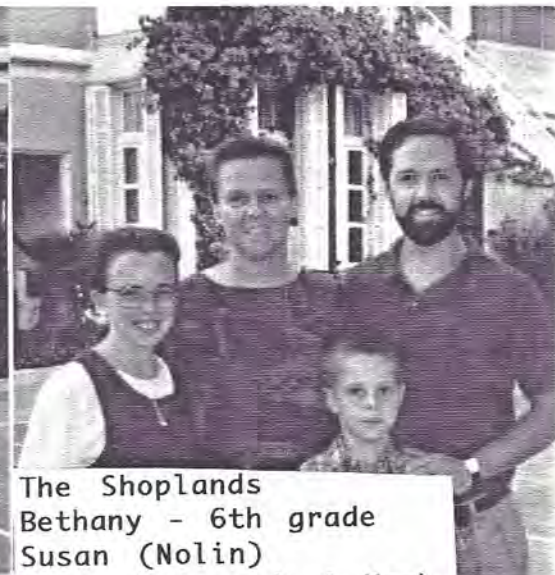
The school calendar is already full of student activities for the year. I've been asked to write about what surprised me upon returning to Schutz. It would be easy to write pages but Janie reminded me, very gently, that a paragraph would do. It's easiest to start with what didn't surprise me. After 29 years away, I knew the moment we turned on to Schutz Street. The big iron gates were opened to reveal that the campus buildings were all in the right places (with the wonderful addition of the pool and auditorium) and we received a traditional warm welcome to Schutz. What surprised me (even though I recall reading about it in the newsletter) was the Sunday-Thursday work week and the Fri., Sat. week-end. It just took a little adjusting. The biggest change is the student population and the purpose of Schutz. The Schutz I remember was a mission school with international kids. The Schutz of 1995 is an American School with an international focus. Coupled with the mission statement, this leads to a different flavor of student body. Within these distinct changes, the commitment to excellence in education and to teaching to the whole student remains intact. There is lots more but this is beginning to look like a paragraph. I must add, however, that the faculty is excellent. There is a shared belief in community which makes working at Schutz a pleasure. Kevin and I are both learning a lot and having a wonderful time. It is good to be back. (I just realized that a big change wasn't mentioned: Schutz is no longer a boarding school. That's another paragraph -- at least).

Surprises found at Schutz as of 9/1/95 ...Susan Nolin Shopland

I expected change and found it. Schutz is a small clearing in the midst of a jungle of completed and continuing construction of taller and taller apartment buildings all around. The traffic on the Corniche reminds me more of what I remembered of Cairo. Egypt in general has expanded, with vast areas of desert reclaimed and Cairo itself running right up to the edge of the pyramids. Modernization has

occurred on campus, with air conditioners in the classrooms and computers everywhere. In addition to the basketball, volleyball and tennis courts and swimming pool that I remembered, there is also a weight room now. Much of what I remember as dorm rooms has been turned into apartments or additional classroom space. And the class schedule conforms to the local schools, with classes on Sunday through Thursday, instead of Monday through Friday. The students are day students, not boarders, from more than 30 countries, who walk or ride the bus to school as kids do everywhere in the U.S.A. These things have changed, and I expected change.

What surprises me the most so far is those things that haven't changed. I am sleeping in the exact same dorm room that I slept in when I was in 6th grade! Although the dorm space has been transformed into an apartment, the bathroom set-up is unchanged; so my family of four has a bathroom apiece! Mangoes are still delicious and abundantly available, in so many varieties that I despair of having enough time to sample them all in just one year. We are overwhelmed with the welcome and hospitality received from Egyptians and non-Egyptians alike. Schutz is still a place where people care about individual kids, and where kids who have lived in many places and moved around a lot can find a haven and a sense of community. Despite the "secular" schedule, church is alive and well on campus in the form of an international service Friday mornings. And mission itself is alive and well in the local Egyptian church.

Perhaps the best surprise was when Ben discovered a book of children's stories at Pharos campus with his grandparent's name on the inside cover. For the only "new" kid in the third grade, it was pretty nice to find out that he belonged, after all. Maybe we'll buy a book for him to put his name in and leave behind, and one day his grandchild can return and be surprised by what hasn't changed, too!

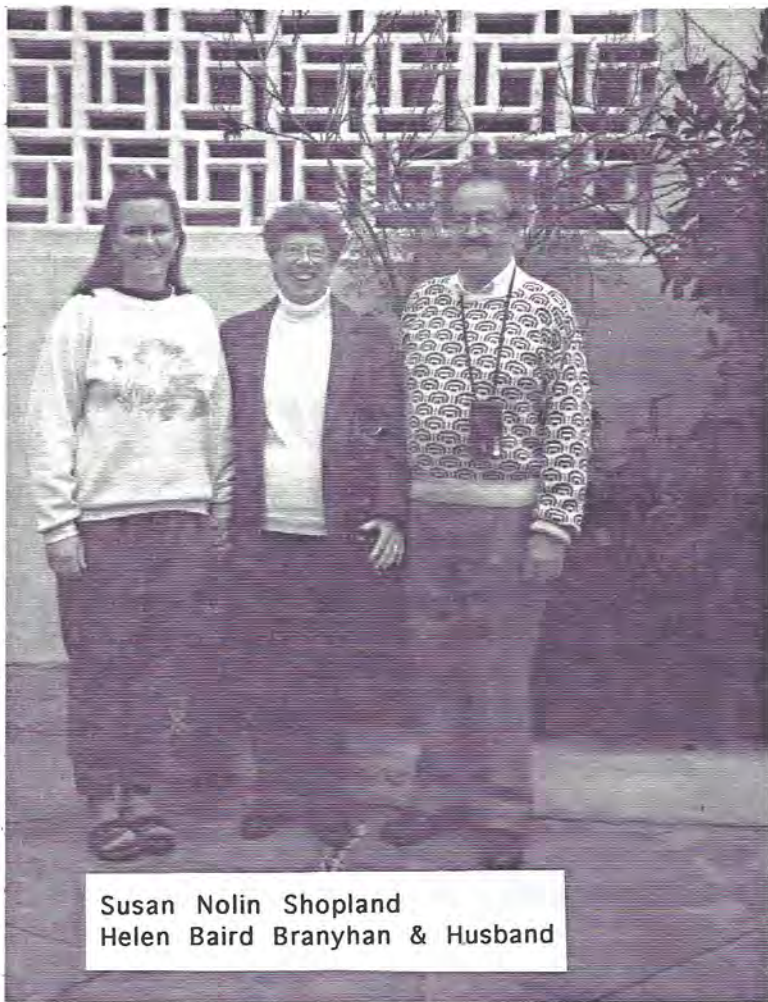
