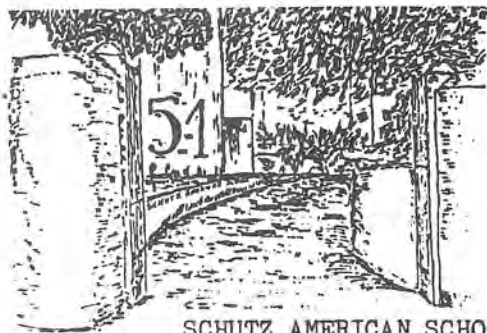

### Tribute to Dolly Pollock 6/90

Fifty years ago Dolly Marie Kelly went as the representative from the Stubenville Presbytery to the national youth convention in Colorado. It was there that she met Ted Pollock. They married a year later & attended part of the 1941 youth convention while on their honeymoon. Thus began the 50 year partnership of two mission-minded young people who dedicated their lives to following God's call wherever it led them.

In the fall of 1946 Ted & Dolly with their two young children went as short term missionaries to the South Sudan. Ted's responsibility was to build a new teachers training school in Obel. Dolly took on the role of business manager and correspondent. She also took charge of the mission garden. Her life long love of plants & this responsibility proved to be one where she excelled. Not only was there enough produce to serve the mission station, but she sold the surplus down river and earned enough profit to purchase an electric generator for the work shop. Completing their assignment in 1950 on their way home they stopped at Tanta Hospital in Egypt for a year to help with construction of a new wing.

After a furlough in the US they returned to the Sudan as career missionaries working in many remote areas. They moved often and lived in everything from an old school house to grass and mud huts. Once they even lived in an old chicken coop. No matter what they started with, Dolly always succeeded in making it a home for her family. In addition to being mom, homemaker, and partner to Ted, Dolly also served as school teacher. She home schooled each of the seven children until they were old enough to attend boarding school.

In 1963 Ted and Dolly were forced to end their service in the South Sudan because of the civil war there. They were then called to serve in the New Tribes Project in south west Ethiopia.

Even after retiring Dolly was never satisfied unless she was living a life of mission outreach. She and Ted served five assignments as volunteer missionaries, three times to Kenya, once to the Virgin Islands and once in Australia. When she wasn't on the mission field she was trying to excite other Christians about the need for mission outreach.

On June 16th the Lord again called and this time He took Dolly home to be with him. She had been fighting a year long battle with cancer. Dolly lived a full and rewarding life serving God through many happy times as well as trying ones. We praise God for his touch on her life. She has fought the good fight, she has finished the race.

George Meloy, Headmaster of Schutz School in Alexandria, Egypt, retires this year. He first came to Egypt in 1948 as a teacher in an Egyptian school for three years; then in 1951 returned to become headmaster at Schutz where he jokingly refers to his assignment as principal, counselor & secretary

It isn't very ordinary for an American overseas school to have a headmaster stay so long in one place. It may be that Egypt's long and glorious past inspired him! Those who have worked with George for any length of time feel no surprise that he has dedicated the greater share of his life to educating children (and teachers) in the comfortable and charming atmosphere of Schutz. Rather, the surprise came when he announced that he really did plan to leave.

The legend of George Meloy is an educational experience of its own. He is a philosopher, with heart, who inspires his staff with the simple notion that the education process is life itself - we all learn something everyday from everything we do. The guiding light for teachers is to utilize the right moment to merge student and knowledge together.

The staff and students will remember the steady, easy-going, unflappable man whose warmth and affection permeated the Schutz family. It is a certainty that Schutz will not be the same when he leaves. However, the uniqueness of his legacy is that his vision in teaching will continue to affect us all.
