The Rev. Glenn P. Reed, 90, died Wednesday, Nov. 29, 1989 in his home. A career missionary in Sudan from 1923 to 1938, he was secretary of the United Presbyterian Church Board of Foreign Missions in Philadelphia from 1938 to 1954. He was also foreign missions secretary and commission representative for the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America in Asmara, Ethiopia, from 1954 to 1969. Upon retiring from the mission field he was a pastor of visitation for the First Presbyterian Church in Bethlehem until 1977.



Truck crash in Kenya takes Jack Swart and two sons

John Robert Swart, Jr. (May 16, 1952-Nov. 19, 1989) and sons Justin Robert (5/30/79-11/19/89) Craig Webber Swart (4/23/83-11/19/89) were killed instantly when a truck with a trailer lost its brakes and hurtled out of control down the escarpment highway, overtaking their vehicle, shearing off the top and crumpling the car like so much aluminum foil. Jack and his wife Deb began their missionary career in 1981 in the Sudan, sent out by the Reformed Church in America. Most recently they have served in Kenya, seconded by the Reformed Church to Portable Recording Ministries International. Jack and Deb have filled a crucial role in the placement of Cassette Library packages in village after village in Kenya, so that thousands could listen to the Word of God on cassettes in their own language. This effort has accelerated during 1989 and borne very evident fruit. PRM remains committed to carrying on this key facet of the work. Deb has agreed that memorial gifts may be sent to PRM designated for continuing their work. Mr. J. Robert Sisley, 91, died March 15, 1990, in Grove City, PA. Bob and Helen Sisley taught at Schutz School from August, 1957 through May, 1962, having retired early from their public school careers specifically in order that they may serve in the church's mission overseas. Bob was acting principal at Schutz one year, while George Meloy was on home assignment. It was during that year that the central classroom and dormitory building was constructed and occupied. Bob Sisley was active in the Alexandria Community Church and in Palais Coptic Evangelical Church, where he was elected an elder. He enjoyed golf, tennis, and life in general. He and Helen travelled extensively in the Middle East and Europe during their summer holidays, and visited the Sudan, where many boarding students at Schutz had their homes. Following their five years at Schutz, the Sisleys taught another eight years at the George Robinson School in San Juan, Puerto Rico, an institution related to the Methodist Church. They retired in Grove City. Helen died in April, 1985. Their children are the Rev. John Robert Sisley, Jr., and Mrs. Martha Beidler. Martha and the Rev. Richard Beidler were married in the garden at Schutz School, at the conclusion of Martha's three-year term teaching at Pressley Memorial Institute in Asyut, Egypt. The Sisleys attended Schutz School Reunions at New Wilmington as long as they were able; Bob was there in the summer of 1989. Bob and Helen Sisley made a deep impression on the lives of all who were students at Schutz from 1957 to 1962. 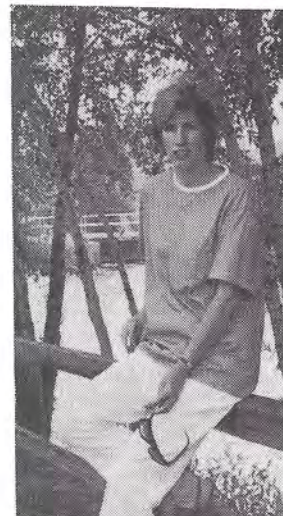
Remarks offered by Willis McGill at the funeral of Martha Watkins, Saturday, January 13, 1990. "Charm is deceptive and beauty disappears, but the woman who honors the Lord should be praised. Give her credit for all she does. She deserves the respect of everyone." With those words the Book of Proverbs comes to a close. "A woman who honors the Lord should be praised." Martha would vigorously object to being praised. But here we are obeying Scripture, not Martha. "A woman who honors the Lord." There are different ways in which the Lord can be honored. It can be done by words that are carefully chosen to make clear scriptural truth or to express some deep thought. Martha left that way to her able husband. Her way was to keep busy doing whatever she found to do to help someone else. It could be taken as symbolic that at the moment Martha drew her last breath she was preparing lunch-time sandwiches for all those with her in the house. One step from "here" to "there", holding a platter of sandwiches! Brad and Martha gave of themselves unreservedly in missionary service in Egypt over a span of 22 years. I shared a common experience with Martha which was rather unusual. Some years after Brad and Martha had become established in their missionary work, Martha's father made the family happy by deciding to come and visit them. But toward the end of the ocean voyage her father took seriously ill and when he reached Alexandria the family's joy of welcome turned into sorrow and grief. Mr. Sims was laid to rest in the same cemetery where, many years before, my father had been buried following the accident in the Mediterranean which took his life. But Martha was not one to care for "long faces" or too much solemnity. She was a person who loved laughter and good cheer. She possessed a sense of humor that was always ready to be touched off. I want to say a word to Martha ... I know she hears me. I don't want to use the word "Goodbye". It has too much of a hint of finality. Rather I would like to use a common Arabic expression. It is "Eela l-Liqaa" which carries the sense of: "Until the next time we're together." And so: Martha, we hold you in our love, Eela l-Liqaa". Or, better still: Until we meet at Jesus' feet. 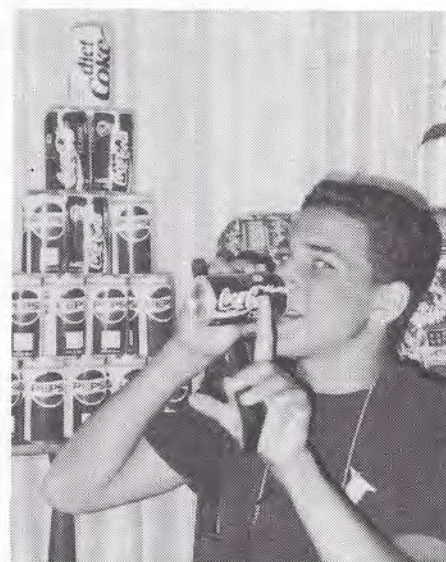
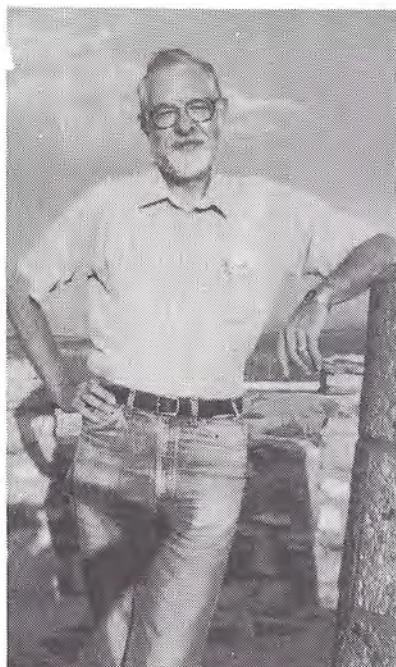
