I hope to be finished with it by this time next year. I'll be returning to Schutz for my ninth year at the end of August. While at the college I was asked to give information about the school for a news release of the college about the Westminster-Schutz Connection. NEWS RELEASE FOLLOWS --

NEW WILMINGTON, PA. -- Westminster College has had a long-standing relationship with Egypt, which spans a period of 119 years, beginning in 1865 when the first 82 Christian missionaries from Westminster arrived in Egypt. This continuing saga of the lives, work, and service of Westminster alumni in Egypt was told by Dr. William A. McGill, now retired and living in Volant, at Westminster's Egypt seminar last December. A copy of his paper is available in the Ralph McGill Memorial Library at Westminster, which was named for his father -- a 1902 graduate who served as a missionary in Egypt from 1905 until 1926, when he lost his life trying to save some children from drowning. Dr. McGill, a 1933 Westminster graduate, followed in his father's footsteps as a missionary in Egypt under the United Presbyterian Church and served for 40 years until his retirement in 1977. His paper, entitled "Westminster in Egypt: The Missionary Story," tells not only of the religious mission of the church, but also of the Christian service of these missionaries in such fields as education, medicine, agriculture, and industry. A new chapter in the Westminster-Egypt story, being written today, might well be called the "Westminster-Schutz Connection." It begins in 1970 when Dr. Joseph R. Henderson, then professor and chairman of education at Westminster, became a consultant to the Schutz American School in Alexandria, Egypt. Schutz was started in 1924 by the United Presbyterian Church as a school for missionary children with about a dozen students enrolled. Last year the school had an enrollment of 215 in nursery through 12th grade. About half of these are Americans, and the others come from 37 other countries. During World War II the school was moved to Assiut in Upper Egypt, but in 1955 it returned to Alexandria. During the late 1950s and early 1960s the school grew to about 100 boarders and nearly as many day students. The Arab-Israeli War of 1967 closed the school for the 1967-68 year, but it reopened in the fall of 1968 under the auspices of Tarkio College, a sister Presbyterian college of Westminster. This relationship lasted for 10 years, and now Schutz maintains its stateside ties through International Schools Services in Princeton, N.J. After its 10-year contract with Tarkio expired in 1978, Schutz became a self-supporting entity with its own independent board, which included Betty Atherton, wife of the ambassador to Egypt, who just completed her term as president; Frank Blanning, former dean of American University in Cairo and director of the Fulbright program; and Jack G. Lorimer, president of the Seminary in Cairo. Enrollment had dwindled in the mid-1960s, as the number of missionaries and missionary children in Egypt had declined. However, many countries started sending scientists, diplomats, industrialists, and other representatives to Egypt, thus assuring the future of the Schutz School. Philips Petroleum and the World Health Organization were instrumental in the reopening of the school in 1968. In April, 1982, Dr. Henderson was called back to Schutz by George Meloy, headmaster, to help the school set up a self-study, preliminary to its application for accreditation by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. One of the shortcomings of Schutz was the opportunity for continuing education for its faculty, and so Dr. Henderson, an expert on world comparative education, went to Egypt from August-December, 1982, and taught two courses to 23 Schutz teachers. Incidentally, both Mrs. Lorimer, the former Mary Louise McCalamont '45, and Mrs. Meloy, the former Mary Lou Lash '48, are Westminster graduates. A year later in April, 1983, the Schutz evaluation was conducted by Middle States Association, and last December the school gained its accreditation. Today Schutz is the only American school in Alexandria. It has an American curriculum, uses American texts, and all classes are taught in English. Students not knowing English are given special English classes, usually taught one-on-one, until they achieve sufficient proficiency in English to join the regular classes. In 1982-83 Chad Ireland of New Wilmington taught on the Schutz school faculty. A 1982 graduate of Westminster, he has been a graduate assistant in education at the college working on his master's degree this year. Next year Westminster will send two faculty members to Egypt. Dr. Henderson will teach graduate courses in the fall term, and Dr. Mary W. Hill, assistant professor of education, will teach in the spring term. This summer two representatives of the Schutz School -- Walter Veasy, community affairs director, and David Seal, a secondary teacher -- are attending the International Studies Institute at Westminster and earning graduate

credits, so the Westminster-Schutz connection continues. In actuality the local connection with the Schutz School begins considerably before Dr. Henderson's appointment as a consultant in 1970, because of the New Wilmington Missionary Conference, which has been held annually each August since 1907. Traditionally the Schutz School holds its own reunion in the New Wilmington Community Park during the missionary conference. Furthermore, a number of missionary children who are graduates of the Schutz School are graduates of Westminster College. Through the expertise of Dr. Henderson and the Westminster educational outreach to Egypt, Westminster is contributing to the success of the Schutz School, which has sent some of its graduates to American colleges and universities such as Harvard, Wellesley, Princeton, Yale, Massachusetts and California Institutes of Technology, Texas A & M, Occidental, Westminster, West Point, Annapolis, Bryn Mawr, and others.

The most significant part for many, including some non-Christians, was the prayer of confession with the entire congregation on its knees. The witness of the service led a large number of people to gather the next week for a second day of prayer, although it had not been planned. Similar encouragement comes with news that a day of united Public Prayers for Peace was also observed in the city of Waw, capital of one of the Southern Regions. Another first is a monthly inter-agency worship service initiated by John Haspels and designed for the many foreign people unable to participate in vernacular services. This service has revealed a deep hunger for Christian fellowship across denominational lines.
