While I have always known there was something very special about Schutz American School, and while I was vaguely aware there were others who felt as I did, it was nevertheless an overwhelming experience to actually meet so many of you; to realize that what really makes Schutz so special is the people, people like you, people whose association with Schutz was so positive their loyalty to it endures.

"You should have handed out the pledge cards," one of you admonished me after my short remarks that included a hint at the possibility of fundraising for Schutz.

No, no pledge cards-yet. Instead, I'd like to share with you two of the decisions the S.A.S., Inc. Board made at its annual meeting the day before the Reunion. If you wish to support those decisions, and you think pledge cards are the way to go, then we'll give them a try.

As some, or many, of you may know, Alice Meloy and Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer are researching, working on and writing the history of Schutz. This ambitious project obviously needs money if it is to be scholarly and comprehensive. The S.A.S., Inc. Board voted unanimously to support this worthwhile project.

The second commitment was to the new Headmaster, Larry Pattee, and was, simply, to try to make funds available for programs as he and the Schutz Board identified them.

The 1993-1994 school year is underway and all of us feel grateful for the new leadership of Larry Pattee. Enrollment is about 170, and new flags are getting made for Afghanistan, Romania, Ukraine, South Africa, and others.

We have a record number of boarding staff living on campus -- 22, plus two babies and one toddler. A new position for a second computer teacher was created because of the expansion of the computer program for students and staff. The area formerly called "treetops" is now a computer center. Also, two positions were reopened- a resource teacher (Lavina Pattee) and a counselor (Laurie Stimson). We probably have the lowest student teacher ratio imaginable. Aren't Schutz kids fortunate?

We also seem to have an especially large number of new staff - 14 positions. The energy and ideas of new people add an exciting dimension to the operation of the school. The present mood is enthusiastic and optimistic.

Since the last newsletter three more former students have visited: Jason Sanders (a 3rd grader in 1980) currently attends college in the U.S.; Ossama El Shazly (a 6th grader in 1977) returned to Egypt seeking employment as a captain a the Red Sea; and Malak Ben Halim (class of 1985) returned to show her daughter the Schutz campus. There are Ben Halims (Libyan) still attending Schutz and the family may soon riva the Pollock's record number of years (25) at Schutz.

Then, just today we had a visit from Tariq (Rick) Elseewi (Kindergarten and first grade in 1972-1974) who is presently teaching in Morocco. He was the first one to sign our new guest book which we are using to keep track of our visitors' current addresses.

The school now has a satellite dish so we can watch CNN news day and night. It was wonderful to watch the signing of the Peace Accord between Israel and Palestine.

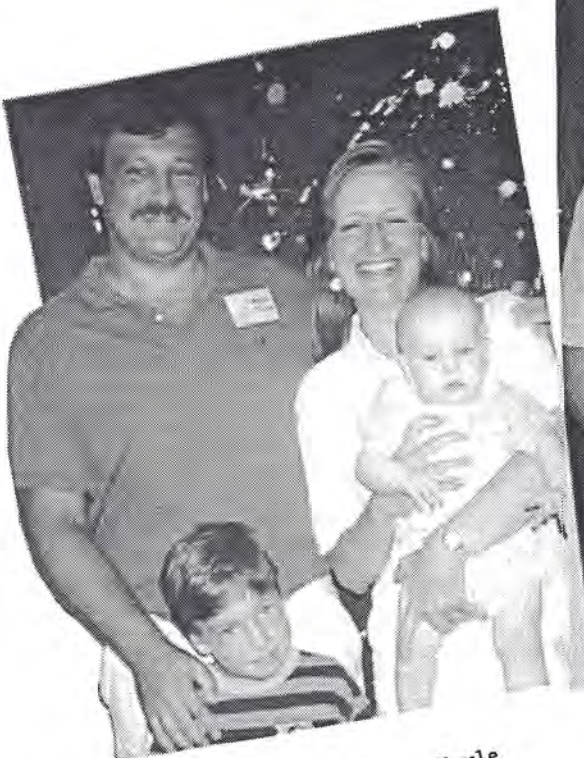

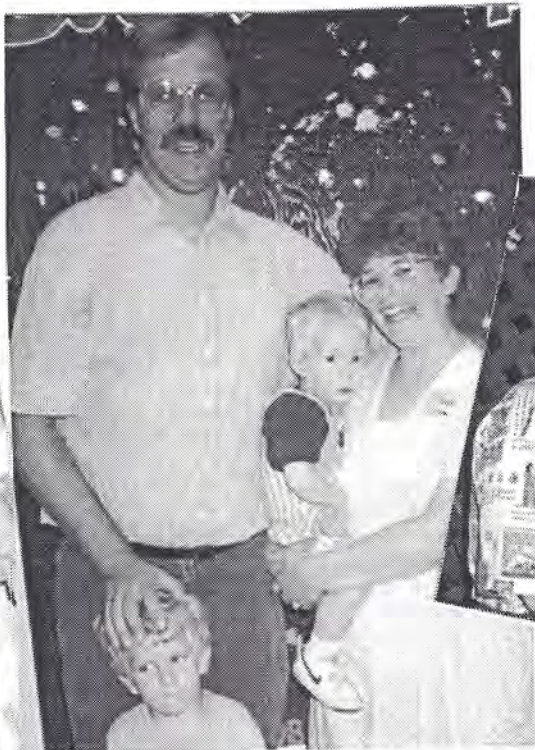

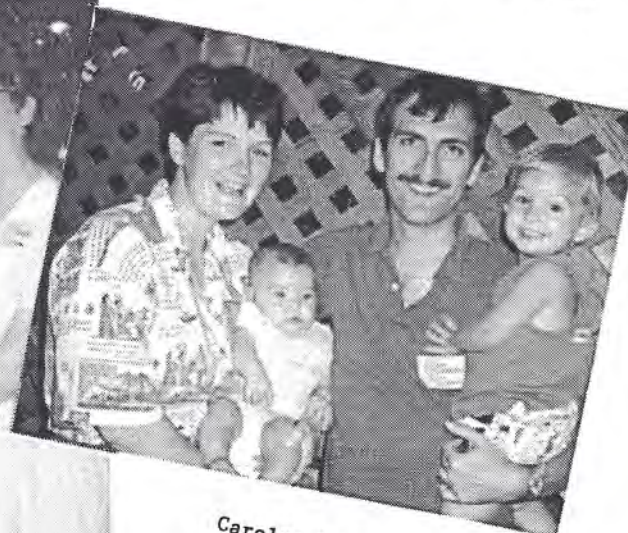

After arriving in the Surma community of Tuligitto to build a small storage shed with the volunteers, we kept hearing the name of Jesus mentioned. When we asked what the Surma were talking about, we were told that they were all talking about us arriving on the Jesus Way. They were referring to the road that was built into their area two years ago. As the road was being built through Surma land and each time the pickup would stop to let the bulldozer push on, gospel tapes would be played over and over. The name of Jesus was heard over and over in these messages. Thus the Surma named the road The Jesus Way. It is our prayer that they will become followers of the Way. Since arriving back in Tum, there have been repeated attacks between the Surma and their neighbors with many lives lost and cattle stolen. In fact the situation is presently so tense, the local government has asked us to postpone our move into the Kibish area. As a result of this unrest, the volunteers were also not able to travel down the Kibish valley and help us build there. Please pray with us that the Surma will come to know Jesus and that by following in His way they will come to love their neighbors. Pray also for a young Surma named Gornay who has been left with Gospel tapes and is guarding our goods left at Tuligit. Family: John T. had three weeks of his Easter holiday with us in Tum. It was wonderful to have him home. We spent two nights camping beside the Coke river. John was also able to go for one night into Tuligit with his dad and two visitors from Washington Presbytery. Having John T. home made us miss Chuck, Desta and Eric in the U.S. but we praise God for the phone - we have contacted them and feel they are getting along very well. Thank you for lifting us up before the Father in prayer. We could give specific examples of times your prayers have kept us safe, helped us gain the Lord's wisdom and helped us to give the right response to people in need or in a tense situation. Keep praying.

Chicago grad students lead in fellowship competitions

University of Chicago graduate students have performed exceptionally well in national fellowship competitions this year.

They have won more Fulbright-Hays Dissertation Research Abroad Fellowships than students at any other school in the nation for the sixth time in seven years.

Chicago students have also set a University record for the number of National Science Foundation (NSF) Fellowships received, and, in the inaugural year of the National Endowment for the Humanities Dissertation Awards, two grants—the maximum number allowed per institution—were awarded to Chicago students.

"The University of Chicago is a relatively small graduate school compared with the other major institutions in this country," said Madeline Hamblin, Director of the Office of Graduate Affairs. "Still, we continue to dominate a number of the competitions. This is not by accident. We have excellent students. And an enormous amount of effort on the part of the faculty, the fellowship advisers and the students

themselves goes into the application process. As a result, we're holding our own and doing better than ever in some areas."

Ten Chicago students are among 60 students nationwide who will receive Fulbright-Hays Fellowships for 1993-94. The Fulbright-Hays Fellowships provide Ph.D. candidates with up to 12 months of support for dissertation research abroad. Students receive a stipend and project expenses, as well as funds for international travel and an allowance for dependents.

The Fulbright-Hays Fellows are Golfo Alexopoulos, John Bate, William Bissell, Anne Blackburn, Gwen Evans, Mohammad Fadel, Gautam Ghosh, John Meloy, Daniel Rosenblatt and Jenny Springer.

I enjoy reading news of, and comments by, Schutzites I knew "way back when". I'd like to ask if anyone knows what became of Maurice Cadwalder after he graduated from eleventh grade in 1941, the first year of Schutz-in-Assiut. He was a day pupil for two years. I remember him as a very outgoing and friendly kid who was always ready to join enthusiastically into whatever was going on at Schutz. He liked everybody, and I never heard him say a mean or angry word to anyone.

Also, does anyone know anything about Ann Cleland? She was another very nice person. The year I was in eighth grade and she was in ninth (1939-1940), I occasionally begged her, jokingly, to give me the cute china cat on her knickknack shelf. She always said no, of course. At the Schutz Christmas party that year, one of my gifts was a small package from Ann. I was greatly moved and dismayed to find that it contained the little china cat! As it was a Christmas present I couldn't give it back to her. I still have that cat; it is my favorite of a collection of over fifty miniature cat figurines. I always think of that unselfish gift from Ann whenever the subject of sacrificial giving is mentioned. I have no idea who gave that cat to Ann, or how much it may have meant to her, but it means a great deal to me.



The Rev. Robert Harry Meloy, Jr.
January 31, 1919 - September 28, 1993

Robert Meloy died at home in New Wilmington Sept. 28. Bob and Dorothea had served as missionaries in the Sudan, Lebanon, Iran and Pakistan. This must be some kind of record. Dorothea (Urey) also served in Egypt, from 1946-1958, teaching at the American College for Girls in Cairo. Bob had gone to the Sudan in 1945; in 1947 he went to Cairo for a year of language study at the American University. While there he met Dorothea; they were married in Cairo June 25, 1948. They served together in the Sudan, at El-Obeid and Khartoum, until 1969, when all missionaries were evicted from that country. Re-assigned to Lebanon, Bob was Mission treasurer in Beirut for one year, after which they were stationed in Tripoli. Once more, in 1975, they left in a hurry, this time because of the outbreak of civil war in Lebanon.

The next year was spent mostly on home assignment at 475 Riverside Drive, NY. Next came Iran, where they were stationed in Tabriz. For the third time, in 1979, they left their field because of political instability, following the overthrow of the Shah of Iran.

After two years of home assignment, they took early retirement, and bought a house near New Wilmington. But duty called, and they responded to an urgent call to serve in Pakistan, where Bob was Mission Treasurer for three years. This time they left their overseas assignment because of health. In 1986 Bob was diagnosed as having amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease). After weeks in a hospital and several months in a nursing home, Bob joined Dorothea in an apartment in New Wilmington. He lived there for six years.

Alice and David Meloy went to Schutz School as boarding students, entering the fourth grade. They would have graduated in 1968, but in 1967 the "Six-day War" between Egypt and Israel prevented their returning for their Senior year. Sarah Meloy entered Schutz for the third grade, and graduated in 1970. Will Meloy attended Schutz from 5th grade until 1967.

A memorial service for Robert Meloy was held in the Neshannock Presbyterian Church Oct. 1. Willis McGill, Jack Lorimer and Bradley Watkins took part in the service. Other mission friends attending were Paul and Martha Jamison, Jim and Rachel Pollock, Ken and Rosella Nolin, Al and Ruth Roode, Norval and Dorothy Christy (from Pakistan), Sara Baker, Lois Finney, Ada Margaret Hutchison and Edna King. We admire the Meloy family for their adaptability to whatever circumstances came along. Their willingness to accept God's plan seems well expressed in these lines from the hymn, "Lead, Kindly Light": "Keep Thou my feet; I do not ask to see The distant scene; one step enough for me."
